#### Individuals Award Recipients at 2002 Conference

This year the Marjorie Carr Award is being granted to Everett Kelly.

Mr. Kelly was born in Foley, Alabama into a family that ultimately grew to 12 children. He earned a M.S. in Zoology from Florida State University and a M.S. in Pharmacy from the University of Florida. Mr. Kelly moved to central Florida in 1963 because of the Chain of Lakes. He is an avid outdoorsman and fisherman.

Mr. Kelly became alarmed and concerned over the degradation of the waterways and ran for the Florida Legislature in 1978 where he served for 22 years (11 terms). He was asked to serve on the Natural Resources Committee where he was

able to provide resources to improve lakes in central Florida. Mr. Kelly was the prime sponsor of the Lake Apopka Restoration bill and the Lake Panasoffkee Restoration Council. During his tenure the legislature passed the RICCO Act, which allowed the state to seize lands. He introduced a bill to limit the phosphorus levels in Lake Apopka and worked to get \$95 million to buy farms. Mr. Kelly brought home about \$150 million to Lake Apopka and the Harris Chain of Lakes and obtained the first \$10 million for the improvements to Lake Panasoffkee.

He introduced legislation with Sen. Kirkpatrick to create the Environmental Education Council.

# This year's recipient of the Scott Driver Award is Al Cheatum.

Mr. Cheatum is the President and CEO of Charlotte Harbor **Environmental Center** (CHEC), a nonprofit organization dedicated to protecting Charlotte Harbor, its estuarine system and all the water bodies in its watershed. CHEC has developed an extensive water quality monitoring network using citizen volunteers to collect, and perform simple physical measurements, water quality samples. The CHEC has received grants from the SWFWM District and other entities to carry out this work and its extensive educational

programs in and around Charlotte Harbor.

#### This year's recipient of the Aquatic Resources Award is Patrick J. Lehman, P.E.

Mr. Lehman is the
Executive Director of the
Peace River/Manasota
Water Supply Authority.
The Authority is a
wholesale water supplier
to its member
governments of Charlotte,
DeSoto, Manatee and
Sarasota counties located
on the west coast of
Florida. Pat has over 26
years of experience in
consulting and public
water utility management.

The Peace River/Manasota Water Supply Authority is responsible for the safe and environmentally sound utilization of the Peace River as a drinking water supply. As such, the organization must protect the resource and it's watershed from impacts from pollution. Through the complete and thorough research including in its permit applications the organization ensures that this aquatic resource is not depleted or reduced in quality to the point that the aquatic flora and fauna that depend on its viability are not impacted.

Through Mr. Lehman's direction, the agency has, as it's prime mission, to protect the aquatic resource for the benefit of all.

#### This year's recipient of the Marjorie Stoneman Douglas Award is Victor Hull.

Mr. Hull has worked at the Sarasota Herald-Tribune since 1987, including the last nine years specializing in growth, land-use, environmental and water issues. His experience covering issues specific to Charlotte Harbor and the Peace River dates back to the late 1980's when he was assigned to cover Charlotte County. His past responsibilities have also included covering growth and water issues in the Florida Legislature.

Victor's ability to relate the facts in a concise and accurate manner has allowed the issues to be communicated in a clear, un-biased manner to the benefit of the community.

#### This year's recipient of the Bob Graham Award is Shannon Staub.

Shannon is a Sarasota County Commissioner. She is a strong supporter of regional sewage treatment systems, water restrictions and is perhaps the most environmentallyoriented commissioner on the board.

Commissioner Staub was very active in support of the Environmentally Sensitive Land purchasing ordinance including a .25 mil property tax, which passed by 67%. She was awarded the 1999

Grassroots Leadership
Award by the Nature
Conservancy. Their
purchase and preservation
program includes lands
and waterways that have
been deemed
environmentally
significant.

Commissioner Staub served on the Manasota Peace River Water Supply Authority for 2 years is presently the Vice Chair, the Charlotte Harbor National Estuary Program and the Sarasota Bay National Estuary Program.

She served on the Board of Directors for the Florida Green Building Coalition, is a past Chair of the Southwest Florida Regional Planning Council and chaired the Water Subcommittee studying water and land use linkage.

#### This year's recipient of the Presidents Award is Chuck Hanlon.

Chuck Hanlon received the President's Award for work "above and beyond" his regular responsibilities as a FLMS Board member. Chuck chaired the Naples conference committee, was a key member of the "Love your Lake" grant program committee, and worked tirelessly throughout the year to recruit sponsors to support the Society. Chuck had many good ideas, but more

importantly he followed these good ideas with a willing hand to get the work done.

# A Baffle Box Can Be Improved

Sean Happel tested the efficiency of different baffle box designs using a Plexiglass model and three different sediment types. He set up a series of experiments to test how well different baffle box designs removed leaves. sand and clay. His experimental design was good, and he used appropriate statistics to evaluate his data. Sean's project display was excellent, and his oral presentation demonstrated that he had researched and was familiar with the impacts of stormwater runoff on water resources.

#### Phosphorus Removal from Everglades Agricultural Area Farm Drainage Water

Patrick Geer's project compared the phosphorus removal capacity of two

species of aquatic vegetation. In addition, Patrick tested nitrogen limitation and the effects of flow regimes on P-removal by aquatic plants.

Patrick used tanks to test and compare p-removal efficiency of water hyacinths and *Chara* using water from the Everglades AAA. Patrick's experimental design was sound and the presentation of his project was excellent.

### Three Shoreline Improvement Projects Receive FLMS Grants

#### Riverbend Park- Jupiter-\$4000

Riverbend Park is part of the Palm Beach County Parks system and is scheduled to open in 2002. This park will feature activities such as hiking, canoeing, and picnicking. Waterways have been reconstructed to rehydrate cypress sloughs and to bring a flow of water to the Loxahatchee river, creating several hundred new acres of lake in the watershed.

volunteers and the Jupiter Environmental Research and Field Studies Academy student body, invasive exotic plants will be removed and beneficial native vegetation will be planted along a 3 acre littoral shelf. Informational signs will be installed to teach the public the benefits of this ecosystem.

#### Central Florida Zoo-Lake Bartram Project-Sanford- \$4000

As part of a large scale project to update the Zoo's facilities, Lake Bartram will be constructed to provide compensation storage, water quality treatment, wetland/upland native plantings, and connectivity with off-site wetlands. The Lake Bartram project will also provide an excellent educational opportunity for

the large amount of Zoo visitors each year. Interpretive graphics will be located around the lake and will offer information on aquatic eco-systems, littoral zone function, wildlife species at the lake, and the Lake's goals as a conservation unit.

# Narcoossee Community School- St. Cloud- \$4000

The Narcoossee
Community School seeks
to restore and maintain the
school lakefront campus
on East Lake
Tohopekaliga. This project
will use classes and parent
volunteers to identify and
remove invasive plants,
and research and plant
beneficial native
vegetation. Signs will be
installed to identify
lakefront plants and the
school will maintain the

environmental restoration for community viewing. The school is part of the public library system so the students will be trained to conduct educational tours of the restoration process. NCS students will also be working with the FFWCC as part of another restoration project in East Lake Toho and will have plenty of hands on training to ensure their awareness of aquatic ecosystem function and beauty.
